For Liturgists

General

When there are persons who have not participated before, give brief instruction on who speaks the different typefaces: regular/liturgist;

bold/congregation; bold italic/all Prepare those who will read with the appropriate link/paper.

Instruct also on the prayers after communion, requesting any who offer a prayer to conclude with “Lord, in your mercy,” so that the congregation may respond “Hear our prayer”.

When silence is observed, the liturgist should be attentive to the felt needs of those gathered. In ordinary circumstance, 10-15 seconds is appropriate. (The liturgist counting silently and then beginning the next rubric) Should an individual or the world situation present a special situation, many minutes of silence can be appropriate.

The liturgist leads the Kyrie a cappella.

The Psalm and readings for the day are found at <http://satucket.com/lectionary/> Scroll down the page to the appropriate date, pick NRSV, then scroll down to the appropriate day. The psalm can be chosen from the several suggested and sung (many are in *Rejoice in the Lord*), read in unison, or read responsively. The congregation should be invited to stand for the reading of the Gospel.

Praying the Suffrages, the liturgist should again be attentive to the felt needs of those gathered. 3-5 seconds of silence between petitions, for folk to offer their own silent prayer or simply reflect, is normal. Frequently following the penultimate petition, someone who has recently lost a loved one, will need more space between petitions.

Eucharist. The congregation shall gather, standing if able, around the table. The liturgy below is minimal. More of the normal liturgy may be added at the liturgists discretion.

The liturgist shall say,

Beloved in the Lord Jesus Christ, the holy Supper which we are about to celebrate is a feast of remembrance, of communion, and of hope. We come in remembrance that our Lord Jesus Christ was sent of the Father into the world to assume our flesh and blood and to fulfill for us all obedience to the divine law, even to the bitter and shameful death of the cross. By his death, resurrection, and ascension he established a new and eternal covenant of grace and reconciliation that we might be accepted of God and never be forsaken by him.

The liturgist shall say, “Let us pray”

Holy and right it is and our joyful duty to give thanks to thee at all times and in all places, O Lord, holy Father, almighty and everlasting God. Thou didst create the heaven with all its hosts and the earth with all its plenty. Thou hast given us life and being and dost preserve us by thy providence. But thou hast shown us the fullness of thy love in sending into the world thy eternal Word, even Jesus Christ our Lord, who became human for us and for our salvation. For the precious gift of this mighty Savior who has reconciled us to thee we praise and bless thee, O God. Send thy Holy Spirit upon us, we pray thee, that the bread which we break may be to us the communion of the body of Christ and the cup which we bless the communion of his blood. Grant that being joined together in him we may attain to the unity of the faith and grow up in all things into him who is the Head, even Christ our Lord.

The liturgist shall then say:

The Lord Jesus, the same night in which he was betrayed, took bread (*here s/he shall take the bread in hand*); and when he had given thanks, he broke it (*here the liturgist shall break the bread*) and gave it to them, saying, “Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; this do in remembrance of me.”

After the same manner also, he took the cup (*here the minister shall take the cup in hand*), when they had supped, saying, “This cup is the new testament in my blood: this do ye, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me.”

The liturgist shall then say,

The gifts of God for the people of God. Come, feast upon him in your hearts with thanksgiving.

The congregation is then served, either individually by the liturgist or by the liturgist serving the first person in the circle, that person the next, and so on. When all have been served, the liturgist shall invite all to be seated.
